Currently, our program has enrolled ten (10) in-school youth.</p> <p>YTD: Cuesta has served thirty-three (33) in-school youth and enrolled twenty-nine (29) new in-school youth.</p> <p>2) During this quarter, our program has exited five (5) in-school youth. Zero (0), (0%) in-school youth has been placed into employment, one (1), (20%) in-school youth has entered into post-secondary education, one (1), (20%) in-school youth have entered into advanced training, and zero (0), (0%) in-school youth have entered into the military.</p> <p>YTD: A total of twenty-seven (27) in-school youth have exited the program. YTD Achievements Our Job Developers to date have served sixty-two (62) in-school youth and twenty-two (22) out-of-school youth.</p> <p>Our program offered (12) workshops this quarter throughout the county to include topics such as, "Presenting Yourself to Employers," "Assessing Interests," "Resume Development," "Job Retention."</p> <p>Linkages were created to include presentations from The Art Institute in San Francisco and a trip to Cuesta College to observe the Automotive Classes for occupational skills exploration.</p> <p>New partnerships were created to include referrals from Public Health and TAPP. A stronger collaboration with the Department of Social Services has allowed our program the opportunity to partner with the Participant Services Staff so that we are better serving young parents.</p> <p>C. Challenges to Achieving Goals Our program continues to have challenges with the Virtual One Stop System (VOS). We are working with the Department of Social Services to rectify these concerns and produce more accurate reports.</p> <p>It has been a challenge to meet the out-of-school performance outcomes for obtaining a diploma or GED as the youth enrolled had a diploma upon enrollment.</p>	
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	<p>We plan to focus on recruiting high school dropouts so this performance measure can be met more readily. This quarter specifically 4 of the 6 out of school youth that were enrolled are high school dropouts and now enrolled in Adult Education with the opportunity to obtain a GED.</p>
