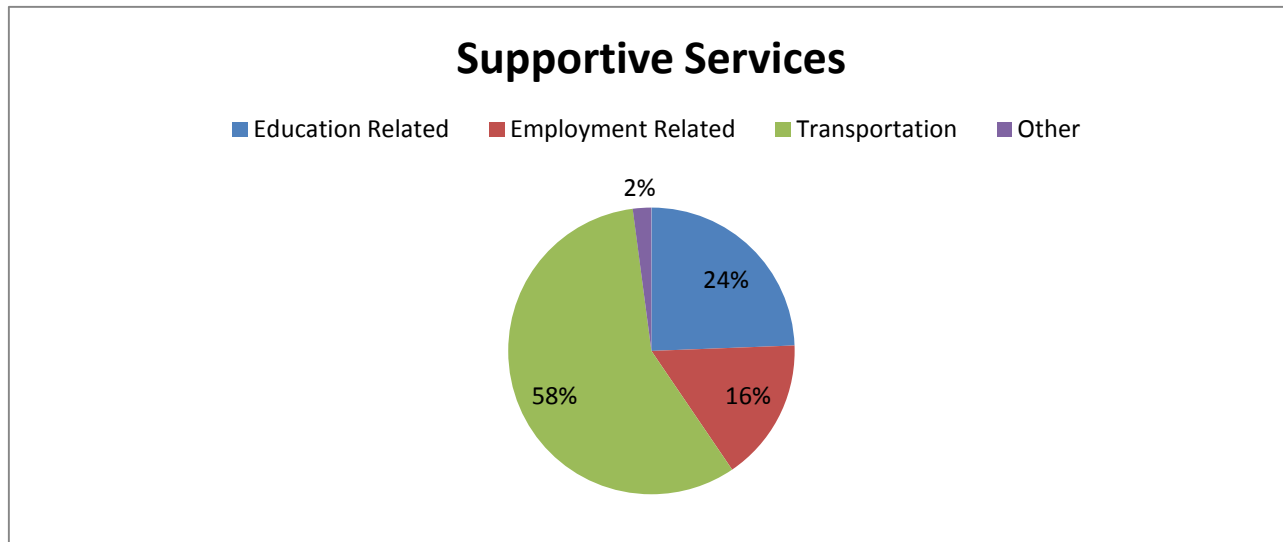


Target Measures <u>In-School Youth</u>	YTD Performance
<p>1. A minimum of 50 WIA eligible In-School youth will be served in PY 13-14. (an estimate of 11 carry-in) with a minimum of thirty-nine (39) being new youth.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Total # of youth served <u>53</u></li> <li>• # of carry-in <u>11</u></li> <li>• # of new youth <u>42</u></li> </ul>
<p>2. 72% of total youth served in PY 13-14 are placed in employment or education in the first quarter after exit quarter.</p>	<p><u>76%</u> of exited youth were employed or enrolled in an education program.</p>

It was estimated that subcontractor would carry-in 16 for a total of 42 youth to be served, however 3 exited in June. (an estimate of 13 carry-in) with a minimum of twenty-six (26) being new youth.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Total # of youth served <u>40</u></li> <li>• # of carry-in <u>13</u></li> <li>• # of new youth <u>27</u></li> </ul>
<p>6. 72% of total youth served in PY 13-14 are placed in employment or education in the first quarter after exit quarter.</p>	<p><u>72%</u> of exited youth were employed or enrolled in an education program.</p>
<p>7. 60% of youth served in PY 13-14 attain a diploma, GED, or certificate by the end of the third quarter after the exit quarter. <b>It is important to note that not all out-of-school youth enter the program without a diploma, GED, or certificate.</b></p>	<p><u>75%</u> of exited youth attained a diploma, GED, or certificate.</p>

3. Summer Youth Employment Opportunities  
(\*Annual update as applicable during time of summer program implementation)

**Target:**

A minimum of ten (10) WIA-enrolled In-School and Out-of-School youth will participate in summer youth employment opportunities including specific services (or referrals to services) during the summer period (July-August).

**PY 13-14 Summer Youth Performance:**

Fourteen (14) WIA Youth participated in summer youth employment opportunities (7 In-School and 7 Out-of-School youth).

**ANCEDOTAL STORY**

A North County youth referred from Liberty High School was interested in obtaining a job working with cars. He had several obstacles including needing academic support to graduate on time, needing support with behind the wheel training, and on how to approach an employer. With the help of his Job Developer, he graduated, received behind the wheel training with one of our vendors, and was placed in a work experience at The Mobile Oil Changers. The employer invested a substantial amount of her time training him and has now hired him to be her Paso Robles technician.
